Using AI Tools for Schoolwork: When Is the Right Time?

In my opinion, students should be allowed to use AI tools for schoolwork starting in sixth grade. By that age, most students understand the difference between getting help and copying, so they can use these tools the right way.

One reason is that AI can help students learn faster. When a topic is confusing, an AI tool can explain it in a simpler way, almost like having a patient tutor who is always ready to answer questions and explain things again until they finally

WHAT MAKES IT DIFFERENT

The "Try this first" tip names the single highest-leverage fix and models it instantly. Flat: "The dog was big." → Stronger: "The dog's head reached my shoulder."
